

The Lord's Prayer

The Lord's Prayer is the most famous prayer in history. Online, you can find it written in 1,698 languages and dialects—a remarkable testimony to how far the words of Jesus have reached across the world.

There are moving stories from World War II of Allied soldiers kneeling in prayer with German prisoners they had earlier been trying to kill. The prayer would begin in one language or another—perhaps a frightened American whispering, "Our Father, who art in heaven," or a weary German murmuring, "Vater unser im Himmel, geheiligt werde dein Name." The words were different, but



the cadence was familiar and the intent unmistakable. Even in the midst of war, the Lord's Prayer united enemies in a moment of shared faith and hope.

Interestingly, both Matthew and Luke record Jesus teaching this prayer, but in different settings. This suggests that Jesus didn't teach it only once—He shared it many times, helping His followers truly learn how to pray. (Many scholars believe this was true of much of what we call "The Sermon on the Mount.")

Jesus never intended the Lord's Prayer to be a museum piece—something framed and admired from afar. Instead, it is a living, breathing guide that shapes our hearts and aligns our will with God's. That's why at St. Thomas, we pray this prayer every week in worship.

We also invite you to join us for our upcoming sermon series on *The Lord's Prayer*, as we explore together what this powerful prayer teaches us about living faithfully today:

- **November 9, 2025** "The Lord's Prayer: A Posture of Faith" Matthew 6:7–15
- November 16, 2025 "The Lord's Prayer: The Daily Bread We Need" Luke 11:1–13
- November 23, 2025 "The Lord's Prayer: The Joy of Forgiveness" – Psalm 32

Each message will help us take a deeper look at the words we pray so often, discovering new meaning, fresh inspiration, and practical guidance for our daily walk with God.

Make the Lord's Prayer a part of your daily rhythm of faith. When prayed with sincerity and openness, it not only connects us with God, it has the power to change us and transform the world.

on Saturday, December 13 from 5:00–7:00 PM. Bring
your family and friends for pictures with Santa, joyful
carol singing, delicious cocoa and cookies, and a walkthrough Nativity complete with live animals, a
Shepherds' Meal, and more! It's a wonderful way to
share the joy of Christmas with our neighbors and
community.

On Sunday, December 14, both worship services will feature our inspiring Christmas Cantata, presented by our Chancel Choir and musicians. Then, on Sunday, December 21, join us for our Traditional Worship at 9:00 AM and the Children's Christmas Pageant at 11:00 AM, where our youngest members will tell the story of Jesus' birth in their own special way. That evening, at 7:00 PM, we will gather for our Longest Night Service—a quiet, contemplative service for those who find the holidays difficult or who are simply seeking peace and comfort amid the busyness of the season.

We'll conclude our Advent journey together on Christmas Eve, Wednesday, December 24, with two beautiful Candlelight Services at 7:00 PM and 11:00 PM. Each service will include Holy Communion and the cherished tradition of singing Silent Night by candlelight—a radiant reminder that the Light of Christ shines in even the darkest places.




