### From the Desk of the Senior Pastor

"Where there is no vision from God, the people run wild, but those who adhere to God's instruction know genuine happiness." (Proverbs 29:18, The Voice)

Beginning this January, a new strategic planning team will enter into a holy conversation with one another, the congregation and its leadership, and the community at large to discern three critical formation questions:

Who are we?
What has God called us to do or be?
Who is our neighbor?

At the heart of this process is discernment about our understanding of our identity as a faith community, our sense of purpose, and our relationship with God. On behalf of this new team, I ask for and covet your prayers! The team came into being as a result of the Leadership Summit that was held in September, which included many key leaders, staff, and members who believed the time was right to assemble this team. Before we left the Summit, we asked each person to go home and pray about this group and then submit (3) names to me before the October Church Council meeting of potential leaders from the congregation who embodied the following skills, attributes and qualities:

- · Represent a range of ages
- Diverse
- Committed believer
- Knowledge of our mission & purpose
- Organized
- Driven / energy will see the process through
- Broad perspective
- Works well with others
- Loves St. Thomas
- Visionary

As a result of this process, seven people were discerned by the Church Council as embodying these qualities and when an invitation was extended to them, they all agreed to serve!

This group, commissioned by the Church Council, gathered for the first time in November to get to know one another and establish a foundation of trust within the team. They also named the group the SPARK Team because they felt this name embodied the aspirations of the congregation. It is our hope that the work of this team will spark the passion of the congregation to live most boldly into its faith and call to ministry.

The SPARK Team will begin meeting weekly in January and hopes to report the work being accomplished to the body – so look for more communication in the months ahead. Ron Campbell agreed to serve as the Convener and Bill Coppa will record and communicate the key recommendations as they come to light. Indeed, this is an exciting time in the life of St. Thomas.

## A Bead and a Prayer - more from Pastor Abi

Before my father died, he gave me a rosary that he had found helpful in his prayer life. At the time, I didn't think too much of it and the beads landed for several years in my jewelry box. Then, several years later when I was at a District Clergy meeting, I was given a set of Protestant Prayer Beads and invited to use them to enhance my prayer life. Certainly, a thoughtful gesture, but nonetheless I did not have personal experience with the beads and so felt a small sense of panic about what to do with them. The beads given were inspired by the work of Kristen E. Vincent who has authored the book A Bead and a Prayer and so I purchased my own copy of the book and began exploring the use of these beautiful prayer beads. Nearly a decade later, I have made several sets of my own, taught a handful of retreats on how to make your own, and generally have found them to be useful in my own prayer life.

Honestly, when I was beginning to make prayer a more regular part of my life, I discovered that my mind tends to wander... I'll begin to pray and then a few moments later I'd be thinking about my grocery list, what needed cleaning at home, my ministry "to do" list — maybe you can appreciate my short-comings on the way to a perfected life in Christ! The beads are tactile, yet simple enough to hold and help me stay focused when I pray. They have become a blessing in helping me to pray for others and for expanding my prayer discipline.



This January, in partnership with the United Methodist Women, we will be offering a Prayer Bead workshop so that folks can make their own set. Our hope is to then integrate the use of the beads in wor-

ship on the 3rd Tuesday of each month as we lift up the needs of the community in prayer. 
